Her 1961 single "I'll Be There" peaked at #12 on the pop charts and was a number 15 R&B hit.

An inquest, taken at Loreauville, Iberia Parish, on the 9th day of May, 1902, before Dr. W. J. Emmer, Deputy Coroner of the Parish of Iberia, upon view of the body of Nicholas DeBlanc, there

lying dead. The jurors whose names are hereunto subscribed, having been sworn to inquire on behalf of the state when and by what means said Nicholas DeBlanc came to his death, upon their oath do says that they found Nicholas DeBlanc hung by the neck on the bridge crossing bayou Teche, being dead; said Nicholas DeBlanc being hung by parties unknown to this jury.

In testimony whereof, the Coroner and jurors of this inquest have hereunto subscribed their names, the day and year above stated.

The above is the last act in tragedy of an attempted assault by Nicholas DeBlanc on the young daughter of Mr. Adrien Gonsoulin, made the evening before. So may it ever be with such fiendish criminals.

New Iberian Enterprise
May 10, 1902

A horrible story of attempted outrage and condign punishment comes to us from Loreauville. Thursday night last, at about 7 o'clock, the daughter of one of Loreauville's prominent citizens was attacked by a colored fiend while in the yard of her father's residence. The young lady fought vigorously and her cries brought relief from the house of her brother-in-law, who beat off the brute, who escaped into the darkness. From the fact that the man had been a trusted servant in the household for years, identification was easy. The alarm was at once given and four or five hundred men at once started a systematic search which lasted all Thursday night and all day Friday. Late yesterday evening he was captured and hung to the bridge that spans the bayou at Maria Central Factory. While these outrages have been committed in other sections of the South, our parish had been singularly free from this crime, and it is a matter of great humiliation that our community should be the next one to furnish the victim. Whether or not the recent turning loose of men by the jurors charged with this crime, has anything to do with emboldening brutes is a matter that good citizens are debating in their minds. Mistaken clemency on the part of those whose duty it is to protect, can return as a curse of all others should slightest mercy shown it.

Louis Juchereau de St. Denis 1676 - 1744

In 1700 explored & established trade with the Natchitoches Indians voyaging on Red River. In 1714 built a garrisoned post to repel the Spanish, promoted trade, searched mines. Married in 1716 at the Rio del Norte Pesidio. Leadership of Indians & victory at Pensacola won knighthood by Louis XV in the military Order of St. Louis. After 1720 he served as commandant of the Upper Cane - Red River - Natchitoches District for 24 years. Born at Quebec in 1676. His tomb (1744) is under the site of the first parish church."

Brief History

According to available records, the history of Immaculate Conception Church begins in 1717 (or perhaps 1716) when the Franciscan, Fr. Antonio Margil de Jesus, walked the twenty-one miles from the Spanish Mission at Los Adaes to say Mass at the French Fort St. Jean Baptiste in Natchitoches. Services were also held in private homes or in the post. Editors Note: While local tradition says the home of St. Denis was used for mass, the family resided in Mexico and Mobile at the time, and did not return to Natchitoches until late 1722.

Natchitoches
Diocese of Natchitoches

Former title of the present Diocese of Alexandria (Alexandrinensis), which comprises all the northern part of Louisiana above 31° N. lat., with an area of 22,212 square miles. The Venerable Antonio Margil, whose canonization is in process, was the first priest to minister within the territory now forming the diocese. From the Ays Indians, west of the Sabine river, Father Margil heard of the Adayes Indians, and in March, 1717, he located them near Spanish Lake, in what is now Sabine county, La. He founded the mission of San Miguel de Linares and built there probably the first church in Louisiana, for, according to the historian Martin, when Pere Charlevoix reached New Orleans in 1721, he found there "about 100 cabins, two or three dwelling houses, and a miserable storehouse which had been at first occupied as a chapel, a shed being now used for that purpose". Leaving Father Gusman in charge, Father Margil journeyed on foot to Natchitoches to minister to the French Catholics there, and then went back to Texas. In 1718, during the brief war with Spain, St. Denis, the French Commandant at Natchitoches, invaded the Adayes mission,

plundered it, and carried away the church vestments. Father Margil heard of it, and in 1721 came back, hunted up the Adayes who had taken refuge in the forests for fear of the French, rebuilt their church, which he dedicated to our Lady of the Pillar, the patroness of the expedition. For many years afterwards the Adayes mission was attended from San Antonio by the Franciscans, who attended also the missions of Nacogdoches and St. Augustin, Texas. In 1725 there were 50 Catholic families at Natchitoches. In 1728 Father Maximin, a Capuchin, was in charge.

Natchitoches Indians

The Indians of the area were friendly and liked St. Denis (his Indian name meant Pretty Legs). They allowed him to set up his small garrison within their village and apparently were helpful to the early French settlers.

Later, in 1690 and 1691, some attempts were made to occupy the "New Philippines", as the territory was called. Twenty-three years later (1714), Cadillac, Governor of Louisiana, sent Hucherau St- Denis into Texas territory to establish trade with Mexico. St- Denis, adventurous and enterprising, met with remarkable success and the trail known as the old San Antonio road from Nacogdoches to the Rio Grande was the artery through which commerce flowed between the nations. Other movements of the French evoked counter actions from the Spanish. It may be remarked that the appellation Texas probably arose from La Harpe's dating a letter from the territory of "Las Tekas", although some ascribe the bestowal of the name to de Leon. The French trade enterprises stimulated Spain to inaugurate in 1715 an extended presidio and mission plan to hold the country and to civilize and Christianize the Indians. Many tribes of these inhabited the broad prairies; some, wild and untamable; others, sedentary, gathered in towns or pueblos, and possessing a rude kind of civilization. Some of these pueblos are still traceable and the ancient town of the Tejas Indians once occupied the site of the present town of Mound Prairie. The Spanish missionary effort spoken of more particularly in another part of this article covers the period from 1715 to 1794. Other efforts were made by the French to utilize this land, claimed because of La Salle's discovery and settlement, and various struggles between both countries were finally settled by the cession to Spain of Louisiana in 1763. Previous to this in 1728, however, Spanish settlers from the Canary Islands supplemented by others from Mexico were introduced at great expense, and Texas was made a separate province. The civilized population, half or more European, however, grew very slowly (3000 in 1714 and in 1805 only 7000).

France could not rest so long as there was a chance to lay claim to the country that appeared so valuable. In 1714 Louis St. Denis and three other Frenchmen secured passports from the governor of Louisiana to go into the Spanish territory and buy cattle at the Missions. Their work was suspected to be that of political observation and at San Juan Baptista on the Rio Grande they were arrested and sent to the city of Mexico. St. Denis finally escaped and reached the French post at Natchitoches.²

By 1713, the French began trade with Natchitoches Indians in central Louisiana. An expedition led by Louis Juchereau de St. Denis founded Natchitoches (pronounced NAK-uh-tosh) in 1714 as a French post for trade with Indians and the Spanish. Fort St. Jean Baptiste was established in Natchitoches one year later to prevent Spanish expansion east of Texas.

St. Denis, a Frenchman from Quebec, led an adventurous life. Having been arrested by the Spanish in south Texas as he tried to establish friendly trade, he served as a guide to Domingo Ramon in 1716 and was a suitor to Ramon's niece.

In 1716, Ramon with St. Denis established six missions and a fort in east Texas and central Louisiana on the Camino Real, including rehabilitation of the Mission Tejas, which had been abandoned soon after its establishment.

St. Denis was later imprisoned in Mexico City and returned to Natchitoches in 1719, where he became commander of the French Fort St. Jean Baptiste.

The Spanish built Mission San Miguel de Linares de Los Adaes in 1719 about 15 miles west of the Fort St. Jean Baptiste. In 1719, war erupted between France and Spain. An attack on the mission by six French soldiers, ordered by Governor Bienville, resulted in the building of the presidio at Los Adaes, which is now a Louisiana State Commemorative Area.

The Death of St. Denis

Jun 12, 1744 Natchitoches Records

I, Sieur Jacques Trupeau, captain in command of the Post St. Jean Baptiste de Natchitoches, was notified at about 6 a. m. that Louis Juchereau de St. Denis, Commandant of Post des Natchitoches, had died at 6 p. m. Jun 11, 1744.

We Charles de Tallefert, Lieutenant of the militia, Ensign De Bolieux and Louis LaCour, cadet of the militia and clerk of the post, went and put seals on a closet filled with several pieces of furniture and a chest, without listing the contents. We left in the hands of Dame de St. Denis, five chests filled with clothing belonging to her and her children. One dozen shirts, 50 horses, 450 jars of oil, 12 negroes.....

Passport of Sieur Louis Juchereau de St. Denis

Biloxi, post of the French Nation and Capital of the Province of Louisiana, with permission of the Council of Commerce of the Company of the West, who has concession of trade In the entire Province of Louisiana. August, 1713.

I, LaMoth De Cadillac, Governor of the Province of Louisiana, Supreme Corn-mander, Governor and Judge of the Civil and Military, housed in the house of the governor at Post de Biloxi, issue to Louis Juchereau de St. Denis, lieutenant in the employ of the King and with commission dily signed in the best form and manner, as direct authority, representing the King, the Governor of Louisiana and the Corn-pany of the West, that the said officer, de St. Denis, with those he chooses to joumey with him, have departed this day in answer to the letter of Reverand Father Francois Hidalgo, dated January 17, 1711 and written at

the Mission Los Delores (actually Mission Marie de Los Delores) In the Coahuile Country of Mexico, who is desiring trade from the French, the letter which I have in my hand at this instant, which is addressed to the Governor of the Province of Louisiana, and in which case is me, La Mothe de Cadillac. This letter shall be respected and shall insure safe passage into and from the Coahuile Country of Mexico, to any and all Frenchmen, soldiers and traders and Indian guides in the direct employ of Sieur de St. Denis on this expedition of mercy and trade, which we do in request of the plea of the said Reverend Father Hidalgo who declares that he cannot keep his Mission and further Catholic Religion, among the Savages, which is desirous of both our Nations, because the route from Mexico City to his Mission is too distant. The said Juchereau de St. Denis is vested with the authority to establish trade agreements with the Hidalgo Mission or any other Spaniards so desirous to trade, in agreement of a price, of which is just and in suitable agreement with both parties concerned. This passport I place in the hands of Sieur Louis Juchereau de St. Denis this day at the time of his departure, August, 1713.
Done at Post de Biloxi (Biloxi) this day August 1, 1713. Duly signed by those In authority at this place:

La Mothe de Cadillac, Governor of Louisiana.
Jean Baptiste de Bienville, Lieutenant Governor.

Louis Juchereau de St. Denis

A younger first cousin of the Le Moyer family, Louis Juchereau de St. Denis was operating a trading concession in the swamps on Bayou St. John (now in the heart of downtown New Orleans) in 1710. He had been with Bienville at the forts in both Mobile and Biloxi. He was educated in France and fluent in several Native American dialects as well as Spanish and most probably Latin. Natchitoches was founded in 1714 by Louis Juchereau de St. Denis while enroute to Mexico on a trade mission. When he reached the village of Natchitoches Indians on the Red River, he built two log huts and left a small number of French Canadians here. This became the first permanent European settlement in the territory later known as the Louisiana Purchase. In 1716, the Sieur Charles Claude Dustine was sent here to build a garrison and outpost to prevent the Spaniards in what is now east Texas from advancing into French Louisiana. This strategic post was named Fort St. Jean Baptiste de Natchitoches.

A detailed drawing made in 1733 by the French architect-engineer Ignace Francois Broutin shows the improvements to Fort St. Jean Baptiste. In August 1732, Broutin came here to strengthen the fort and to add barracks, a small warehouse and a house for the warehouse keeper. The fort continued to serve as a French frontier outpost until 1762 when France's defeat by England in the French and Indian War forced her to cede the Louisiana colony to Spain. Under Spanish rule, the fort served as a trade center. Since its original purpose of protecting a territorial boundary no longer applied, the Spanish allowed the fort to deteriorate. The fort was in such ruins by the time the United States acquired the Louisiana Purchase in 1803 that the Americans could no longer use it and so built Fort Claiborne nearby. The site obtained for the reconstruction of Fort St. Jean Baptiste is located on Cane River a few hundred yards south of the original fort site. Based upon Broutin's plans and extensive archival research, reconstruction began in 1979. Building materials were obtained locally and many 18th century techniques were employed in the reconstruction.

Need to confirm parentage: There is confusion as to whether she is the daughter of Diego Ramon II s/o Commandant Diego Ramon 2nd husband m. Felician Camacho y Botello or Diego Sanchez s/o Diego Sanchez 1st husband m. Felician Camacho y Botello. Confirmation of marriage date could provide answers. The Handbook of Texas Online on the section on Manuela Sanchez Navarro, indicates that Felician married twice. The section on RAMON, Diego indicates that he had a son name Diego Ramon. However, it states that Emanuella is RAMON's granddtr by marriage and RAMON, Domingo's niece by marriage. It is confusing as the statement pertaining to Domingo's relationship to Manuella is in association to a statement that Juchereau de St. Denis is his nephew by marriage.

ST. DENIS, MANUELA SÁNCHEZ NAVARRO DE (1697-1758). Manuela Sánchez Navarro y Gomes Mascorro, the daughter of Diego Sánchez Navarro y Camacho and Mariana Gomes Mascorro y Garza, was baptized in Monclova, Coahuila, Mexico, in 1697. Despite never having lived in Texas, she figures as prominently as any other woman in the early history of the region. Her paternal grandmother, Felician Camacho y Botello, was married first to Diego Sánchez and afterward to Commandant Diego Ramón. When Louis Juchereau de St. Denis arrived on July 19, 1714, at San Juan Bautista Presidio (at the site of present-day Guerrero, Coahuila), Ramón placed him under house arrest in compliance with a 1713 viceregal order prohibiting entry of foreign traders or their merchandise into Spanish territory. Word of the Frenchman's presence was forwarded to the viceroy, who did not respond until the following March. During the intervening months of St. Denis's detention he became engaged to Manuela. News of the impending union reached the viceroy in Mexico City before St. Denis arrived there to face charges and defend himself. He no doubt knew his engagement to Manuela would enhance the chances for his successful outcome in Mexico, since the viceroy knew that Manuela was directly descended from several of the military, political, and financial elite of New Spain. After St. Denis's exoneration, on August 22, 1715, the general junta appointed him conductor of supplies for the planned Ramón expedition to Texas. Under the command of Domingo Ramón, the commandant's son, the 1716 expedition was instructed to reestablish Spanish missions in East Texas. This expedition was the first step in permanent Spanish occupation of lands northeast of the Rio Grande.

The year of Manuela's departure from New Spain to join her husband is uncertain. Whether she joined him first in Mobile, Alabama, or Natchitoches, Louisiana, also is a unknown. Earliest census records for Poste St. Jean Baptiste des Natchitoches, where St. Denis assumed command in 1721, indicate that the first two of the couple's children were born in New Spain. Manuela could have joined St. Denis in the French colony as early as 1719 but no later than 1721. They eventually had two sons and five daughters, including Marie Petronille Feliciane, who married Athanase de Mézières on April 18, 1746. Whatever problems existed to keep St. Denis out of New Spain, they were resolved by 1743. In January of that year he wrote the French crown requesting permission to resign his command at Natchitoches, retire from the crown's service and, with his wife and minor children, move to New Spain. Months later his request to retire was granted, but his request to move to New Spain was denied. To compensate him for the rebuff, the French crown assured St. Denis that his children would be placed as advantageously as possible in the royal service. St. Denis died in Natchitoches on June 11, 1744. Manuela, a widow at age forty-seven with three or four minor children, remained in Natchitoches. She continued to live in the house St. Denis built for her on property now occupied by the campus of Northwestern State University of Louisiana. She died in Natchitoches on April 16, 1758. The St. Denis children and their families played significant roles in the continuing development of Texas, Louisiana, and New Spain.

San Juan Bautista : Presidio del Norte

Home of Manuella Sanches de Navarro, wife of Louis Juchereau de St. Denis. The commandant of this post was either her grandfather or step grandfather. There is much argument and many published items that are being disputed. Much argument regarding her name stems from the naming practices of the Spanish during that period in history. But she WAS part of the Ramon family of San Juan Bautista and Presidio del Norte. She was probably the daughter of Diego (Jr) Ramon's wife from a previous marriage. She was raised as Diego Ramon, Jr.'s daughter in the home (Presidio: San Juan Bautista) of his father, Don Diego Ramon. It was common to choose either your mother's surname or your father's surname. {A good example of this is Cabeza de Vaca who chose his maternal grandmother's name because of a famous forefather.---I have often wondered if the French "dit" names were not much the same.} The fact that St.Denis was married to a close relative of Diego Ramon -a powerful --- at one time acting as Governor of All of Spanish Texas (which included a large part of Mexico)---played an important role in Texas, Louisiana and Mexico's history.

A persistent priest named Francisco Hidalgo was based in San Juan Bautista. He and the Ramons built the missions from Mexico all the way to Nacogdoches. Domingo Ramon and a company that included his brother Diego (II) and his brother-in-law, St. Denis, were sent to colonize along the Nueces River and to build missions. In 1718, the San Antonio de Bejar and de Valero churches were built where the city of San Antonio is located today. The chapel in the Bejar mission was called El Alamo.

Major Diego Ramon, who led the expedition which resulted in the placing of the Mission San Juan Bautista five miles south of the Rio Grande, was an extraordinary person. He was a native of the parish of Santiago de Queretaro*. Ramon's name is first found in connection with the history of the mission movement on the northern Mexico frontier in 1674 when he was a young officer. He was in charge of Governor Alonzo De Leon's post at Santiago de la Monclova in 1687. After DeLeon died, Ramon served as interim governor of Coahuila. He led the expedition which founded Mission San Francisco Xavier forty miles northwest of Monclova. His name was connected with San Juan Bautista (May 1701) until his death in 1724.

At the age of fifty, Ramon, one-time lieutenant of Alonso de Leon, is a historical enigma...appears to have been dedicated to the cause of Christianizing the Indians...at the same time, however, he evolved a lucrative business for himself and his sons...contraband trade with the French. A complete list of Spanish Presidios and Missions in Texas. (under construction)

St. Denis (Don Luis de San Dionis / Louis Juchereau de St.Denis) is said to have led a French expedition up the Red River as early as 1700. He claimed that he had crossed Texas in 1705 and made contact with the Spaniards at San Juan Bautista. (The Spaniards left no record confirming this.) There is record of a later contact "Relacion hecha por Don Luis de San Dionis y Don Medar Jalot de viaje que ejection desde la movila hasta el Presidio de Diego Ramon"- Is his companion possibly JOLY???? St. Denis was the commandant of Biloxi when Cadillac issued him a passport on September 12, 1713. He was to take 24 men and as many Indians as necessary to go in search of the mission of Father Hildago. He was to purchase cattle and horses for the French province of Louisiana. The party set out from Mobile in late September.

They built a log fort at what is now Natchitoches, traded for cattle and horses. All but four of the company returned to Mobile.

St. Denis, Penicault, Pierre Largen and Medar Jalot continued to the Colorado River, accompanied by Chief Bernardino and twenty five braves of the Tejas nation. After a victorious battle with Karankawa Indians on the Colorado, twenty-one braves returned home and the party continued to San Juan Bautista on the Rio Grande. St. Denis arrived impeccably dressed in tailored linen on July 19, 1714 and was placed under house arrest- not to leave the home of Ramon. According to Weddle on page 104 of San Juan Bautista, "The known facts are sufficiently dramatic to belong in a novel.* (*There was one= "Ride the Red Earth" by P.I. Wellman copyright 1958).

While 'imprisoned' at San Juan Bautista he wooed and won the heart of the seventeen year old granddaughter of Diego Ramon. She was lovely, dark-haired Manuela, daughter of Diego Ramon II. " St. Denis and Jalot <where are the others?> were later taken to Mexico City to prison with Manuela's uncle, Domingo Ramon, in escort. After his eventual release, Manuela and Louis married in 1715. The marriage had far reaching implications on the development of the frontier and on the relations between France and Spain. With this marriage a trade route (although still officially illegal) was opened across the Texas frontier.

hoping thereby to set a good example, but though he baptized some of the dying, the medicine men persisted in trying to assuage the pestilence by appeasing the manitous, especially that of the French who they thought had power over their own. Half of the village soon died.(see fn. 71)

That the plague which raged among the Mascouten also ravaged the French can be assumed. The winter of 1702-1703, and the year 1704, saw epidemics of sickness both in Canada and Louisiana.(see fn. 72) In any case, Juchereau himself died in the autumn of 1703, his death sealing the doom of the establishment.(see fn. 73)

Of the accomplishments at the post little is known. Some hunting had been done and several thousand buffalo skins had been collected. It is probable that some of these were tanned into leather. The Sieur de St. Lambert, who was second in command to Juchereau, reports that he started to remove the skins and leather down the river, but lost them through a rise in the water and by theft by the Indians.(see fn. 74) As for Juchereau's men, those

The Sieur de St. Lambert, who was second in command to Juchereau, reports that he started to remove the skins and leather down the river, but lost them through a rise in the water and by theft by the Indians.(see fn. 74) As for Juchereau's men, those who survived undoubtedly became coureurs de bois. Le Moyne Bienville in 1704 mentions that as many as 110 or 120 men were in that vicinity and that beaver pelts were being collected there. Some voyageurs had even asked for the right to take these furs to France for sale.(see fn. 75)

At the time of Juchereau's death, accusations were being lodged against him to the effect that his activities on the Ohio were centered about the beaver trade rather than in the tannery business. The Company of Canada led in these accusations, charging that Juchereau had followed in Le Sueur's footsteps. They lamented the fact that employees of their own were constantly deserting "to join with this commerce."(see fn. 76) Bienville, it has been observed, admitted that voyageurs and coureurs de bois were operating in northern Louisiana in small bands.(see fn. 77) At Detroit it was charged that Juchereau and Pascaud had connived to trade throughout the West even "up to the neighborhood of Detroit."(see fn. 78) M. Sulte charges that Juchereau traded in collusion with Le Sueur, La Forest, Tonty, and Pascaud at Green Bay, operating through coureurs de bois centered at that post.(see fn. 79) It was also charged that Juchereau and his men hunted slaves among the

southern Indians.(see fn. 80) The information at hand does not warrant these accusations.

The death of Juchereau and the collapse of his establishment silenced his enemies, while the truth about his activities in the western country will probably forever remain buried with him. Even Thérèse Migeon seems to have been silent after the death of her husband.
